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OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. ELIZABETH WARREN, U.S.

2 SENATOR FROM MASSACHUSETTS

3 Senator Warren: The Personnel Subcommittee will come4 to order.

5 The subcommittee meets today to markup an original 6 bill, the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 7 2024. We will hold this subcommittee markup in open 8 session.

9 I am confident that we can conduct our business 10 publicly without disclosing classified information or 11 adversely impacting the process.

12 In this regard, I ask that any senator wishing to offer 13 an amendment or raise an issue of a classified nature defer 14 that for the full committee's consideration.

While this subcommittee is meeting in open session, the entire contents of the markup book are subject to amendment through its consideration by the Armed Services Committee and are, therefore, embargoed until passed by the full committee and reported to the Senate.

Traditionally, the subcommittee has used the chairman's mark as a markup vehicle. Without objection, we will use the chairman's mark as a markup vehicle subject to amendment.

24 There being no objection, it is so ordered.25 I remind members when calling up an amendment for



consideration please identify the amendment by amendment
 number. This courtesy will help eliminate confusion and
 speed up consideration of all amendments.

4 Consistent with the practice and precedent of both this 5 subcommittee and the full committee, the following б amendments will not be an order and will not be considered: 7 amendments involving a significant matter which is not 8 within the jurisdiction of the subcommittee; amendments that 9 involve the jurisdiction of another committee that has not 10 agreed to consideration of the amendment for inclusion in 11 this subcommittee's markup; and amendments that would 12 constitute an earmark.

Further, it has been the practice that any amendment to add funding must be accompanied by an offset. Accordingly, if any senator proposes an amendment that would increase spending she or he must also identify an offset to pay for it.

Unless the offset can be made from funding under the jurisdiction of this subcommittee the amendment must be offered at the full committee.

It is our obligation to live up to our promises to support service members and their families. All three of my brothers served in the military. I know how hard service members work and I know how hard their service can be on their families.



1 This mark and the work of this subcommittee continue a 2 long tradition of bipartisanship. I want to thank Senator 3 Scott, Ranking Member, for being a great partner as the 4 ranking member of this subcommittee.

5 We come from opposite sides of the aisle but we are in 6 fierce agreement that we must do everything we can to 7 support those who serve.

8 I am proud of this mark, which supports a 5.2 percent 9 pay raise for all service members and for our civilian 10 defense workforce. This is the largest pay raise in 11 decades.

12 This mark also fully supports the administration's 13 request to fund family programs, childcare programs, and 14 health care for service members, their families, and 15 retirees.

16 The mark before us consists of 78 legislative 17 provisions, 34 items of special interest, and two budget 18 items. This mark strengthens the all-volunteer force, 19 improves the quality of life for everyone who serves, and 20 ensures that we instill command climates to prevent sexual 21 assault and harassment.

This mark also includes important steps to address a deeply troubling trend of military suicides. I particularly thank Senator Blumenthal and Senator Sullivan for their work on this important issue.



Last September, Senators Hirono, Blumenthal,

Gillibrand, and I opened an investigation into the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps, or JROTC. Our investigation was prompted by disturbing reports of instructors in the program sexually harassing or assaulting the students enrolled in the program.

7 This mark strengthens program oversight and instructor 8 certification requirements. It also provides the DOD with 9 authority to hold programs accountable if they fail to 10 protect students.

11 It requires annual reporting on allegations of 12 instructor misconduct and makes sure students know their 13 rights. Following reports of some schools forcing students 14 to participate in JROTC the mark also makes clear that this 15 is a voluntary program.

I look forward to studies this bill requires from the GAO that will help guide our work to address any other shortfalls in keeping students in the JROTC program safe. It also includes a provision requested by Ranking Member Wicker to establish and support more JROTC units.

I am also proud of how this mark addresses medical debt. No one should be pursued by debt collectors because they had a medical emergency.

This bill allows civilian debts owed to military treatment facilities to be held in abeyance until DOD issues



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its interim rule to waive those fees. It also requires DOD
 to provide briefing on how medical debt is affecting service
 members.

One of the greatest risks to our national security is
allowing defense contractors to distort our national
security priorities.

7 The American people deserve to know that our nation's 8 decisions are based on what is best for our security, not on 9 what results in the biggest payday for Lockheed Martin or 10 Raytheon. I will continue my efforts to strengthen these 11 laws in the NDAA.

Similarly, it is important that our military decisions not be influenced by well-organized lobbying efforts conducted by foreign governments.

A recent investigation revealed that an astounding number of retired military officers secretly working for other countries. This mark strengthens the review process for approving any such work. It also subjects those approvals to public scrutiny by removing the cloak of secrecy.

This mark also includes a provision to require the Secretary of Defense to ensure that each installation of the Department of Defense that has an Indian tribal nation or tribal interests located near the installation has a dedicated tribal liaison at the installation. The mark also



enhances due process rights for civilians who hold security
 clearances.

And, finally, as the military continues to struggle to meet its recruiting goals, I am proud of the many provisions in this bill to enhance recruiting and to support service members and their families.

We still have a lot of work to do and I plan to offer
additional amendments throughout the process to address
these shortfalls. Even so, this is a strong start.

10 The Biden administration just announced major steps to 11 support military families. Our mark takes those steps 12 further, including initiating a pilot program to determine 13 whether enhanced pay can help address the childcare crisis 14 that is particularly acute for service members.

This is a matter of concern for all families with children but it is a particularly urgent problem for service members who are often stationed in places where they do not have family nearby as a safety net and who may have a spouse or partner whose schedules are as unpredictable and demanding as their own. This mark is an important first step in addressing the childcare crisis.

The mark also take steps to address the mental health issues facing many of our military families. The mark expands nonmedical counseling services provided by the Department of Defense to qualifying populations without



1 regard to their geographic location.

2	These are only a few of the highlights of the
3	legislative package we present for markup. I want to thank
4	all of the members of the subcommittee and the full
5	committee for their work as well as their staff.
6	I especially want to thank the committee staff: Jon
7	Clark, Gary Leeling, Andy Scott, Sofia Kamali, Noah Sisk,
8	Jenny Davis, Sean O'Keefe, Katie Magnus, and Brendan Gavin.
9	And at this point I invite Ranking Member Scott to make

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STATEMENT OF HON. RICK SCOTT, U.S. SENATOR FROM
 FLORIDA

3 Senator Scott: First, I want to thank Chairwoman
4 Warren for her leadership of the Personnel Committee.

In keeping with the tradition of the Armed Services
Committee she and I have worked together in a bipartisan
manner on this year's Personnel mark.

8 I truly believe the Armed Services Committee is the 9 only committee in Washington that works the way it was 10 designed. I am proud of the mark we have produced and will 11 now briefly go over some of the highlights.

For our military families the mark includes a provision that authorizes \$50 million in impact aid for local school districts serving military children and an additional \$30 million for school districts providing support to military children with severe disabilities. This is an increase of 12 percent from last year.

Additionally, the mark authorizes contracted mental health professionals to work with eligible military and their families without regard to home state licensing, which we hope will increase the availability of these services.

The mark also requires a briefing on parental involvement in Department of Defense education activity schools, which is the first step to ensuring our parents know that they are encouraged to be involved in their



1 child's education.

In the area of military end strength the mark authorizes active duty end strength based on current service projections, which account for the historic recruiting challenge.

The mark also would provide additional flexibility to the Secretary of Defense to manage the overall end strength of the force.

9 To address the recruiting challenge the mark requires 10 each military department to establish a future service 11 member preparatory course to increase the number of 12 Americans who are eligible for military service.

I want to commend the Army on their efforts to
establish a course at Fort Jackson that is already helping
the Army address their recruiting challenges.

16 The mark also provides significant new authorities to 17 the JROTC, which is another proven method to increase 18 interest in military service.

For military compensation the mark reauthorizes numerous special and bonus payout authorities and creates a new methodology for computing junior enlisted basic allowance for housing rates.

The mark also expands the eligibility for domestic cost of living allowances and protects service members living overseas from excessive reductions to their cost of living



1 allowance.

For military health care the mark would waive cost sharing requirements for these annual mental health visits for active duty family members and expand the ability for on-base dental clinics to provide care for military dependents.

To make becoming a military medical provider more
attractive we would increase the living stipend for
recipients of the Department of Defense Health Professional
Scholarships by 40 percent.

These are just a few of the highlights in this year's overall bill. I would like to -- I believe this mark is good legislation that will help solve the main problems facing this subcommittee, which is the ongoing military recruiting crisis.

Again, I want to thank Chairwoman Warren for her leadership of this subcommittee. I also want to thank professional staff members Sean O'Keefe, Katie Magnus, Brendan Gavin, Jon Clark, Gary Leeling, and Andy Scott for their great work on the mark.

I look forward to our continued collaboration as we work to pass a final version of the National Defense Authorization Act.
